

HERE WE GO!!

- 1. Knowledge is power Hence The Beginners Reef
- 2. Patience is everything The more you have or develop the better!
- 3. Start slow Build the solid foundation first!
- 4. You WILL get addicted If you are not already!
- 5. It's going to get expensive Just accept it!... And hide the receipts from your spouse ;)
- 6. When in doubt don't do it This is a BIG one!
- 7. Don't get lazy with maintenance Procrastination Kills!
- 8. Don't chase tank parameters Your tank will find its own levels to some degree
- 9. Use only quality test kits I have used only Salifert test kits for years
- 10. Take pride showing your tank, you will have earned it!
- 11. Get the biggest tank you can afford and fit More stable but more expense
- 12. Don't get too many tanks They will all suffer Focus your efforts
- 13. Never compromise on quality wait and save that little but longer
- 14. Research every animal you want to have habitat, food, compatilibility
- 15. Don't cycle your aquarium with fish. Its cruel! Use a bacteria culture like Dr Tim's
- 16. ALWAYS quaratine new livestock An ounce of prevention.....




Green Chromis are an easy, hardy fish that are perfect for the beginner. Keeping them in odd numbers seem to survive longer for some strange reason!

MORE...

- 21. Create a fish stocking plan to check for compatibility while tank is cycling
- 22. ALWAYS Acclimate your new fish slowly over an hour QT (Quarantine tank) preferred
- 23. Learn what fish you CANNOT have in your tank
- 24. Many fish jump when startled, keep your tank covered with mesh or canopy
- 25. Buy a good variety of Clean-Up-Crew critters to look after various cleaning jobs. Scarlet Hermit Crabs are great detritus eaters while not as aggressive towards your snails when they want a new shell!





- 28. Provide empty shells for Hermit Crabs Keeps your snails safe from attack!
- 29. Only keep Angelfish in large +150G aquariums
- 30. Do not keep more than one Pygmy Angelfish in a tank

Always Use FRESH WATER To Top Off Evaporation Loss

- 31. Have a variety of meaty, green, pellet and microscopic foods
- 32. Mandarin Goby's only for established tanks with large, reproducing Pod populations
- 33. Damselfish and large Clownfish can become very mean!
- 34. Don't put a Tang in a small tank Min 75 Gal for one only!
- 35. Don't overfeed your fish
- 34. Learn what corals you CANNOT have in your tank
- 37. Let you and your aquarium mature several months before adding corals
- 38. Start your journey into corals with easy corals like zoanthds and Palythoas
- 39. Learn about Palytoxin Poisoning Its Very Rare but it could save your life!
- 40. Don't buy a coral that grows like weeds because your new tank is bare



AND MORE...

- 41. Research if that coral is going to sting its neighbors
- 42. Research how big a coral is going to get
- 43. Always dip your corals Kill those unwanted hitchhikers!
- 44. Always inspect your new coral and plug for pests & nuisance algae
- 45. When able, get into coral fragging and make some \$\$\$
- 46. Always wear protection when fragging See Palytoxin Poisoning
- 47. Don't hand feed your fish You can pass on bacterial diseases to them
- 48. Beware of anemones, they can move or release and get sucked into powerheads
- 49. Use coral food to enhance colors Reef Roids, Reef Chili & Coral Frenzy are great!
- 50. Buy nori from the grocery store Cheaper than the fish store
- 51. Beach sand and play sand will only cause you problems Sand from Carib-Sea Is great
- 52. Add liquid garlic to fish food Helps fish immune system
- 53. Make your own frozen food It will save you a fortune! Blend it and freeze in Zip-Locs
- 54. Have a QT tank ready to be set up quickly Mine cost <\$100 and can be setup in 10 min
- 55. Have a staple of common medications on hand Cupramine & Prazipro are good basics

Water Changes Are A Great Way To Reduce Nitrates


- 56. Take quick action to remove a sick fish Prevent it spreading an illness or disease
- 57. Never leave a dead animal to rot away It will spike Ammonia, Nitrate & Phosphate
- 58. Learn the different fish & coral diseases to spot any signs early
- 59. Learn about nuisance pests and algae like Aiptasia, Asterna Snails, Bryopsis
- 60. Get your family supporting your reef It is a family member





YEP MORE...

- 61. Never go to a local fish store without a plan
- 62. Don't always believe what your guy at the store recommends!
- 63. Never impulse buy livestock Always research
- 64. Not everyone is right Ask lots
- 65. Join an aquarium club and get on the forums



66. Befriend a local reefer to come to your rescue if needed

67. Youtube is great for reefing 'How-To' videos

- 68. Plan your tank Moving it is very stressful
- 69. Get a drilled tank or have it drilled for a sump
- 70. Get a sump Hide all that equipment!
- 71. Set the stand height for optimum viewing Looking down on coral improves color
- 72. Have a power outage plan
- 73. Have a vacation sitter plan
- 74. Dry Rock is the best if you dont want pests and hitchhikers
- 75. Refugiums work Get one installed
- 76. Always have Fresh RO/DI water stored and ready to go
- 77. Have backup equipment
 Especially Heaters & Pumps
- 78. Always rinse hands before putting in the tank
- 79. Awesome tanks begin with awesome aquascape planning
- 80. Bare bottom tank looks un-natural in my opinion





STILL MORE...

- 81. Never work on your tank when you are tired
- 82. Never test your water parameters when you are drinking alcohol
- 83. Never adjust anything if you're tipsy! Alcohol has led to many a tank crash!
- 84. Test, Test, Supplement, Wait, Test, Tweak
- 85. Keep dog toys and kid's toys out of the room Flying Objects Break Tanks!
- 86. Get in the habit of touching your tank when you pass Temp check
- 87. If your tank relies on house AC, keep it serviced and on when you're away
- 88. Have a digital water thermometer with alarm as an easy indicator
- 89. Get an aquarium controller I will never have a tank without one!
- 90. Automation can be a great time-saver, but keep it maintained and monitored
- 91. LED's are intense and can bleach coral Coral aclimation is essential
- 92. Never ship livestock in the dead of summer/winter
- 93. Get a polystyrene box and heat pack for transporting livestock long distance
- 94. All electrical outlets should be GFCI protected Test them regularly
- 95. Fit a smoke alarm near your equipment or in your stand! It may save your home!

Train a Fellow Reefer On Your System Before Leaving On Vacation

- 96. Clean the glass often and make it sparkle
- 97. Saltwater driping on an electrical powerbar can cause fires
- 98. Don't steal your partner's kitchen utensils Get your own!
- 99. Have a good supply of 'Old Towels' for tank use only
- 100. Don't spray aerosol air fresheners in the same room as the tank



AND MORE...

- 101. Keep on top of salt creep
- 102. Fully operate any plumbing valve every week to keep it from seizing
- 103. Always properly secure any electrical equipment
- 104. Always install drip loops in power cords
- 105. Change bulbs and filters when recommended

- 106. Webcams on your tank when on vacation relieve anxiety
- 107. Teach what you have learned Welcome to The Beginners Reef!
- 108. Help other new tank owners
- 109. Only adjust one thing at a time and wait before trying something else
- 110. Always have 2 online heaters Don't rely on just one
- 111. Service your chiller filter regularly in summer
- 112. Buy the best equipment you can afford
- 113. Secondhand equipment is gold
- 114. Saltwater rusts tools. Keep them rinsed and dry
- 115. Watch your tank in the middle of the night with a red flashlight It's a different world!

Popping Coral Colors

- 116. Don't let kids tap on the tank
- 117. Put a lock on your stand if you have kids
- 118. Keep your chemicals, supplements and tools out of kids reach
- 119. Don't just buy it because it's shiny
- 120. Buy what you need But buy the best



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Magnetic Algae Scraper

ALMOST THERE...

- 121. Magnetic Algae scrapers Rule!
- 122. Mag Scrapers with razor blades Rock! Glass Tanks Only!
- 123. Keep razor blades away from tank seams
- 124. Never pull out a power cord with wet hands
- 125. Keep a running journal/whiteboard of test parameters
- 126. Learn how to acclimate new corals to LED lights, especially SPS
- 127. Buy a magnifying glass and learn about Redbugs when getting into SPS
- 128. Keep your filter floss clean or replaced regularly
- 129. Never clean filter media under the faucet Rinse in used tank water
- 130. Deep 'Picture Window' tanks suck for cleaning
- 131. Plan for access to each corner of your tank
- 132. Keep floor area clear when working on a tank

133. Place down towels on the floor when working in the tank

134. Use good steps if required – Not a chair!

135. Ensure your new salt mix is identical to existing water parameters

136. White vinegar baths are great for cleaning equipment

137. Copper-based fish medications can kill some corals/Inverts

138. Nitrates are lowered through water changes

139. Buy a battery-operated air pump for power outages

140. Find a tank you like and learn all about it, their setup, maintenance etc





FINALLY...

- 141. Water flow is King in a tank with corals
- 142. Buy the biggest Protein Skimmer you can afford and fit
- 143. Do not use Crushed Coral as a substrate
- 144. UV Sterilizers are not needed
- 145. Air Bubbles are bad for a saltwater tank Airpumps for power outages ONLY!
- 146. Do not use Test Strips for testing Not accurate
- 147. More light is better for corals
- 148. Install an Automatic Top-Off (ATO)
- 149. Never add a chemical you cannot test for
- 150. Always run carbon on a reef tank



3 MORE FOR LUCK!

- 151. Own a Refractometer
- 152. Filtration is not a place to cheap out on
- 153. Always use RO/DI filtered water in your tank, ATO & water change
